Co-Option Policy

The co-option of a Parish Councillor occurs when a vacancy has arisen and no by-election has been called. A by-election can be called if 10 or more electors make a request to Wiltshire Council within a statutory period (normally 14 days) after the notification of a vacancy.

To ensure that a fair and transparent process is undertaken, the procedure below will be followed by Pewsey Parish Council:

- 1. On receipt of written confirmation from Wiltshire Council that a by-election has not been requested, the casual vacancy can be filled by means of co-option. The Clerk will:
 - a. Advertise the vacancy on the Council noticeboards, website and social media pages.
 - b. Report to the Council that the Co-Option policy has been initiated.
- 2. Applicants for Co-Option will be asked to:
 - a. Provide information about themselves by way of completing a short application form or by sending a current CV. (A copy of the application form is attached).
 - b. Confirm their eligibility for the position of Councillor within the statutory rules. (A copy of the Eligibility Form is attached.)
- 3. Copies of the application forms will be circulated to all Councillors by the Clerk prior to the meeting of the Full Council where the Co-Option will be considered. All such documents will be treated by the Clerk and Councillors as strictly private and confidential.
- 4. Voting will be according to the statutory requirements, in that, a successful candidate must have received an absolute majority vote of those present and voting. If there are more than two candidates for one vacancy and no one, at the first count, receives a majority of the votes given to the rest, the candidate with the least number of votes will drop out. The remainder must then be put to the vote again. This process must, if necessary, be repeated until an absolute majority is obtained.

Councillors shall vote by secret ballot.

In the case of an equality of votes when only two candidates remain, the Chairman of the meeting will have a second casting vote.

5. After the vote has been concluded, the Chairman will declare the successful candidate duly elected.

Co-option Eligibility Form

In order to be eligible for Co-Option as a Parish Councillor you must be a British subject, or a qualifying citizen of the Commonwealth, the European Community or Republic of Ireland. You must also be 18 years of age or over on the "relevant date", that being the day on which you are nominated, or if there is a request from 10 electors, the day of the by-election. You must additionally be able to agree with the following qualifications set out below.

Please circle which of the following four points applies to you.

- a. I am registered as a local government elector for the parish; or
- b. I have, during the whole of the twelve months preceding the date of my Co-Option, occupied as owner or tenant, land or other premises in the parish; or
- c. My principal or only place of work during those twelve months has been within the parish; or
- d. I have, during the whole twelve months, resided in the parish, or within 3 miles of it.
- 2. Please note that under Section 80 of the Local Government Act 1972, a person is disqualified from being elected as a Local Councillor or being a member of a Local Council if he/she:
 - a. Holds any paid office or employment of the Local Council (other than the office of Chairman) or of a joint committee on which the Council is represented; or
 - b. Is a person who has been adjudged bankrupt or has made a composition or arrangement with his/her creditors (but see below); or
 - c. Has within five years before the day of election, or since his/her election, been convicted in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man of any offence and has been sentenced to imprisonment (whether suspended or not) for not less than three months without the option of a fine; or
 - d. Is otherwise disqualified under Part III of the Representation of the People Act 1983 for corrupt or illegal practices.

The disqualification for bankruptcy ceases in the following circumstances:

- i. If the bankruptcy is annulled on the grounds that either the person ought not to have been adjudged bankrupt or that his/her debts have been fully discharged;
- ii. If the person is discharged with a certificate that the bankruptcy was caused by misfortune without misconduct on his/her part
- iii. If the person is discharged without such a certificate.

In (i) and (ii) above, the disqualification ceases on the date of the annulment and discharge respectively. In (iii), it ceases on the expiry of five years from the date of discharge.
